

Duncan Webb retains seat, electorate swings right

On election night in mid-October, more voters opted for centre right parties in general electorates, while a swing further left in the Te Tai Tonga Maori electorate unseated the incumbent.

Labour MP Duncan Webb retained his Christchurch Central electorate seat on election night, but based on the provisional figures, his majority has been slashed from around 10,000 in 2020 to under 1900 in 2023. His support was strong south of Innes Rd, around St Albans School, the St Albans Community Centre (hosting its first polling booth since before the 2011 earthquakes) and Rehua Marae but overall National dominated the total party vote in Christchurch Central. Green party candidate, Kahurangi Carter, could become a list MP if the Greens are entitled to another list MP after special votes are totalled.

In Te Tai Tonga, geographically the largest of the seven Maori electorates [covering the whole of Te Wai Pounamu (South Island), Rakiura (Stewart Island), Wharekauri (the Chathams) and part of the area around Wellington], Te Pāti Māori candidate, Tākuta Ferris, unseated Labour incumbent Rino Tirakatene. His whanau have held the southern seat since the 1920s but Rino could remain in Parliament as a list MP. Four of the seven Māori electorate seats look likely to come under the direction of Te Pāti Māori and three under Labour.

When special votes (around 20 per cent of total votes) have been counted, the final vote will be notified on November 3. Special votes could change some vulnerable electorate seats, including Banks Peninsula, where National leads by only 83 votes. The final overall party vote could also change the fortune of some candidates on the party list. Numbers could also change with the by-election scheduled for Port Waikato in late November.

National and ACT are likely to form a coalition government, possibly with NZ First but with the MMP system and the mercurial Winston Peters as kingmaker, who knows. Discussions behind closed doors on who will form the new government are already happening. Will Winston Peters, and seven other NZFirst MPs, be part of a three party coalition or choose to sit on the crossbenches. It could be weeks before a new government can be formed.

Plastering an additional message in orange across political hoardings like this one in Springfield Rd was not enough for National candidate Dale Stephens to overturn Labour's Duncan Webb in the Christchurch Central electorate. Dale campaigned long and hard since the start of 2023, co-hosting political meetings with party bigwigs on special topics in the cardboard cathedral, standing on street corners chatting with locals and knocking on countless doors.



Te Pati Maori candidate Takuta Ferris had but one sign in Cranford St in early October but he managed to lift the Te Tai Tonga electorate from Labour's Rino Tirakatene, whose family have represented the southern electorate since the 1920s.

Mark Wilson takes the helm

When Jason Harvey stood down from the chair of the St Albans Residents' Association recently he was replaced by near neighbour Mark Wilson.

The pair came to prominence in St Albans when the government decided that the motorway off-ramp should run down Cranford St, Barbadoes and Madras St to the inner city. They

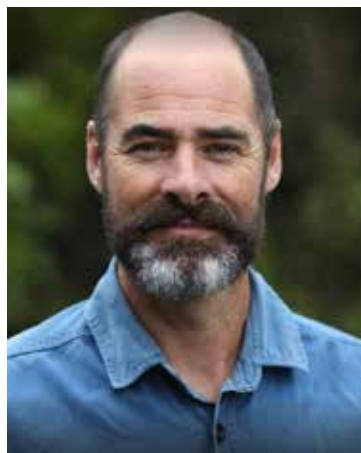

didn't want a bar of that and organised a petition against that plan, while also pushing for better public transport north of the city. The current traffic flows down Cranford St and Sherborne St. Christchurch City Council is still dealing with the increased congestion and the consequences of rat-running down side streets.

He's also been pretty vocal on the need for the quake-demolished Shirley Community Centre to be rebuilt.

To "make communities more liveable and accessible" Mark stood as an independent candidate for election to the local community board and city council but missed out. His background includes geotech work but he is currently working as a stevedore and is Branch Secretary of the RMTU at Lyttelton Port. He rebuilt his home in St Albans following battles with insurance companies.

He's also not afraid to get his hands dirty and is a great proponent of reusing materials. He built the 'cage' that houses the beehive in Kōhinga Mārā, and constructed the pantry that sits on the centre forecourt from recycled timber. ☞

Automated irrigation installed in Malvern Park

The sight of agricultural K lines spraying water over Malvern Park in the summer months will be a thing of the past after underground irrigation pipes were installed in late October.

The installation costs of the automatic irrigation system are being met by the Canterbury Rugby Football Union, which is based at the adjacent Rugby Park. The Union has a 'critical' need to use the park for pre-season training to prepare for the Crusaders 2024 campaign, while work is carried out on Rugby Park.

They are also paying for the water supply. The automated system will save on water when it operates during the evenings.

Operational costs and maintenance will be worked out between the Christchurch City Council and the Union with ownership and management of the system subject to negotiation between the two bodies.

The first most people knew about the irrigation plan was when the Waipapa/Papanui-Innes-Central Community Board discussed this at their October 12 meeting. The Union had been under the impression that it could simply go ahead with the work at the park until it was pointed out there was a process to be followed. That matter has been sorted.

The CRFU has an existing agreement with CCC to use the 3 hectare Malvern Park for pre-season training but as a public park it is also available for casual community use and can be booked by groups.

Members of the public should be able to access the toilets, the children's playground and the park's exercise machines which SARA helped install. And if they happen to be at the park during training sessions they might catch a glimpse of Canterbury's best rugby players training.

New solution aims to deal with speeding traffic

After nearly two years of trials Christchurch City Council appears to have come up with a solution to counter speeding traffic rat-running off Cranford St through Francis Ave and Flockton St, with a decision likely at the Waipapa/Papanui-Innes-Central Community Board meeting in November.

In the past 18 months, various options have been considered, some of which have been trialled but will not be implemented. Re-opening Forfar St was considered, as was left in and left out access, chicanes and cul de sacs.

A decision is expected to be made at the community board meeting in November when the latest plan for raised platforms will be discussed with 7 planned for Flockton St

and 5 in Francis Ave, at 70 metre intervals, to encourage consistent and reduced speeds. The road will remain two-way but each platform will be narrowed with build-outs or islands.

These plans will reduce on street parking – Flockton St will lose 46 parking spaces and Francis 8 spaces. Footpaths and berms will not be touched. Traffic levels are unlikely to return to levels before the northern arterial was built but with forced speed reductions it should be safer.

A new road surface (an added benefit) will be laid on both streets to reduce vibration from traffic long term.

Long wait for solution to eastern odour

Work is well underway to deal with the smell caused by the fire two years ago in the wastewater plant but less than a kilometre away is another source of malodorous air that drifts west during an easterly into St Albans and further west.

The facility, which is owned by the council but operated by Living Earth, is too small for what it is expected to process. The odour breaches the plant's resource consent and causes problems for nearby residents.

A permanent, purpose-built facility sufficient to deal with Canterbury's green waste is several years away (it requires design work and further consultation) but the council has been consulting through a "let's talk" page on what to do in the meantime including:

- Sending it all to Kate Valley, where red bin waste gets sent

- Sending it to a northern North Island facility capable of processing green waste
- Staying at the current plant with an additional outdoor screen -this could happen almost immediately
- Providing stage 1 processing, which is indoors in tunnels, and trucking stage 2 waste, which has been taking place outdoors, to a secondary processing site. This could take 6-12 months
- Reducing the amount of material accepted at the site so there is less need for outdoor processing

The council expects to make a decision on a temporary solution to the problem in December.

Council thinks longterm, plans 60 years ahead

Current high school students, who will be among the beneficiaries of the longterm Greater Christchurch spatial plan are among those speaking at the hearings of the Draft Spatial Greater Christchurch Plan from October 26 to November 4. They will be joined by community boards, telecommunications and electricity suppliers, retirement village companies and others to help form a plan that will protect heritage and mana whenua while guiding intensified

housing, land use, and transport planning, through changes brought about by increased population, climate change and earthquakes across Greater Christchurch, Selwyn and Waimakariri councils. Over the next 60 years, the population is expected to grow to 700,000 and possibly 1 million if the current rate of growth keeps up.
